We are proud of our broad and diverse curriculum, as seen by our carefully chosen topics for study during Black History Month. Pupils learnt about significant black individuals that lived within the eras and topics they are studying. Within Year 1, pupils have been learning about inventors. Within this topic, they focused on Marie Van Brittan Brown, an African American nurse and inventor, who created the video home security system.

In Year 3, children learnt about John Blanke, a royal trumpeter, who performed in the courts of Henry VII and Henry VIII. In Year 4, pupils explored the work of the architect David Adjaye and linked his work with their knowledge of Roman architecture. In Year 5, children explored the life of the pharaoh Ahmose Nefertari and used their existing knowledge of Tutankhamun, when engaging with artefacts from her tomb.

Pupils were incredibly engaged when learning these topics and our Black History Month lessons are an important part of our History curriculum.

### **EYFS Postman Visit**

On 18<sup>th</sup> December, the Reception year group welcomed a special visitor – a local postman- who offered insights into his crucial role. Students were eager to learn more about a postal worker's responsibilities. We asked lots of interesting questions about the postman's routine about early wake-up times, the busy Christmas period, the challenges of locating house numbers, and the logistics of handling oversized parcels. This engaging session not only fuelled the children's curiosity, but also connected their classroom activities and curriculum with the real-world context. 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# <u>Early Years</u>

Within Early Years, we have focused on bringing one element of the students' learning to life every term. These curriculum enrichment opportunities and role play contribute to a well-rounded early years education, promoting not only academic growth but also the development of essential life skills and cultural understanding in our young learners. They help to boost their confidence and experience of rich cultural capital experiences, encouraging students to express themselves freely and creatively. Listening skills are also cultivated as they listen to instructions, stories and partake in team activities. In the first half term, we hosted the Tiger's Tea Party based on our Literacy text 'The Tiger who came to Tea' in which students made their own jam sandwiches, had a picnic together and had a special visit from the Tiger himself (thank you Mr Adams!). In the second half term reception students gathered to mark the 5th birthday of our beloved phonics character - Read Write Inc's Fred the Frog. Fred plays a crucial role in helping young learners blend phonics sounds and embark on their reading journey. The afternoon was filled with engaging activities. Children enjoyed lively party games, cut Fred's special birthday cake (creatively designed by the staff), and enjoyed playing pass the parcel. Adding a creative touch, the students also decorated their own cupcakes and enjoyed eating these as part of the afternoon. 


